

PERSPECTIVES ON TOBACCO CONTROL IN THE AMERICAS

INSP 2004

Overview:

This course will provide students with a comprehensive overview of tobacco and tobacco-related issues from a public health perspective. Topics will include epidemiology, nicotine addiction, determinants, health effects, social and economic impacts, treatment issues, prevention, interventions and program and policy issues. Students will be exposed to experts in the field who bring real world experience in tobacco control in addition to academic expertise. This course will focus on a population health perspective on the tasks and strategies of tobacco control and the most frequently asked questions about each topic.

Objectives

To provide a comprehensive overview of research and public health issues relating to tobacco and health, from mechanisms of nicotine addiction to societal costs of tobacco use.

To provide an opportunity for students to practice critical thinking and public health practice skills in the substantive area of tobacco and health.
